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

	Oxbridge	Other Universities
University system	Collegiate	Non-collegiate (except Durham)
Tutorial sizes	2-3 per Tutorial/Supervision	>8 per Tutorial
Workload	Average of 40 hrs/week Law: 8 to 12 essays a term	Lower UCL: 8 essays a year
Nature of study	Emphasis on self-study	More on Teaching
Term Length	8 weeks	10 weeks or more

Academics



1. Course structure

- Most important factor in distinguishing Cambridge from Oxford is the course structure of the subject you want to study.
- Oxford and Cambridge don't offer identical courses.
- Visit the Cambridge and Oxford websites and do your research on the course structure at each university and figure out which one you prefer.

2. Exam structure

- At Oxford your results in your Finals determine your class of degree.
- At Cambridge students are examined formally at the end of each year and are awarded a degree classification for each part.



Cambridge

- Grade requirements, written work and atinterview-assessment varies from college to college
- Usually A*A*A for most sciences and A*AA for arts courses
 - 40-42 IB, 776
- Interviews around 75% of all applicants
- Pre-interview assessments or at-interviewassessments

Oxford

'centralised' requirements (not college-dependent)

- Between AAA and A*A*A
 - 38-40 IB, various
- Interviews around 50% of all applicants
- Usually pre-interview assessments

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Applications

Summary:

- 1. Oxford slightly lower grade requirements
- 2. Cambridge conducts more interviews & at-interview-assessments more common
- 3. Cambridge's requirements are college-specific
- 4. Cambridge's colleges may modify offers
